* Three quarters of U.S. colleges and universities have now announced ACT/SAT-optional or test-blind/score-free admissions policies for <u>current high school seniors</u>. Already more than half of all four-year schools have stated that they will not require ACT/SAT scores for fall <u>2023 (current juniors</u>). See <u>FairTest.org</u> for more information.



* Newly test optional:

Boston University will be test optional for first-year applicants applying for fall 2023 and spring 2024.

FINANCIAL AID:

- * Please be aware of your college's financial aid and scholarship deadlines. These deadlines are typically not flexible you may miss out on potential aid if you do not submit these documents in time.
- * The <u>Free Application for Federal Student Aid</u> (FAFSA) opened on October 1. This form must be completed if you are applying for need-based financial aid. Click <u>HERE</u> for resources on preparing for, completing, and submitting the FAFSA.
- * Check to see if your colleges also require the <u>CSS Profile</u> (review their financial aid website). Use this <u>guide</u> for help on completing the CSS Profile.



SCHOLARSHIPS:

Amazon Future Engineer Scholarship assists high school seniors who have completed a computer science course and plan to continue their education by attaining a bachelor's degree in computer science, software engineering, computer engineering or other computer science related field of study. Recipients of the award receive \$10,000 at an accredited four-year college or university as well as a paid summer internship at Amazon after their freshman year of college. Apply by January 25.



APIA Scholarship Program: Scholarship awards range from one-time \$2,500 awards to multi-year \$20,000 awards. Applicants must be of Asian and/or Pacific Islander ethnicity and be the first in their family to attend college or meet financial criteria. See eligibility here. Apply by January 26.

Association of Women in Mathematics Essay Contest: Contest is open to students in grades 6-12 and undergraduate students. Student must submit an essay based on an interview with a women currently working in a mathematical career. Apply by February 1.

Harriet Fitzgerald Scholarship: The Sunflower Initiative will award another Harriet Fitzgerald Scholarship in the amount of \$10,000 to a woman who in the Fall 2022 term will begin attending an undergraduate women's college in the U.S. or Canada. Apply by February 1.



(ISC)² Women's Scholarship offers scholarships from \$1,000-\$5,000 per recipient. Applicants must be pursuing or planning to pursue a degree with a focus on cybersecurity or information assurance. Apply by February 28.

Jimmy Rane Foundation Scholarships: Students will be selected based on academic excellence, community involvement, leadership skills, awards and honors, and financial need. Winners will receive up to \$5,000. Apply by February 7.

MathWorks Challenge: is a contest for high school juniors and seniors. Through participation, students experience what it's like to work as a team to tackle a real-world problem under time and resource constraints, akin to those faced by professional mathematicians working in industry. The Challenge awards \$100,000. Learn more here.

SGT Ryan E. Doltz Scholarship: is open to all graduating seniors from a Morris County high school who are members of the band. Apply by April 1.

Society of Manufacturing Engineers Scholarship: High school seniors looking for scholarships for college can apply for over 30 scholarships from the SME Education Foundation. Applicants must be planning a career in manufacturing (manufacturing engineering, technology, or closely related field). <u>Applications are due</u> by February 1.

Garden Club of New Jersey Scholarship: awards provide financial aid to students and promote the study of Horticulture, Floriculture, Landscape Design, Botany, Plant Pathology, Agronomy, Environmental Science, City Planning, Land Management and related subjects. Apply by February 1.

McDonald's HACER National Scholarship: High school seniors with at least one parent of Hispanic heritage are eligible. Scholarship recipients are selected based on academic achievement, financial need, community involvement, and personal qualities and strengths. <u>Apply</u> by February 7.

The Quell Foundation Fighter Scholarship: is awarded to a select high school senior or a current undergraduate/graduate student being treated for a diagnosed mental health condition. Apply by February 15.

The Rockaway Valley Garden Club, Arlene Persson Memorial Scholarship: awards up to \$1,500 to a graduating senior from Boonton, Mountain Lakes, Morris Hills High School, Morris Knolls High School, Morris Catholic, Morris County School of Technology, and the Craig School. This scholarship rewards demonstrated effort and interest in horticulture and/or environmental initiatives within school or the community by the applicant. The Summer Science Program offers teens an exhilarating and inspiring immersion into hands-on experimental science. Each team completes a real research project, taking and analyzing original data. In 2022 we will operate six programs:

three in Astrophysics: research in near-earth asteroid orbit determination at New Mexico Tech, Univ. of Colorado Boulder, and Univ. of North Carolina Chapel Hill; two in Biochemistry: research in fungal crop pathogens at Purdue Univ. and Indiana University; one in Genomics: research in evolution of antibiotic resistance, also at Purdue. SSP is open to current high school juniors (and a few truly exceptional sophomores) who have completed the pre-requisites by summer, and will be at least 15 years old. Learn more here.
