

UPCOMING MLHS EVENTS:

December 22: Alumni Panel. We are lucky to have recent graduates join us to speak about the college application process and transition to college. Juniors will attend the annual Alumni Panel during block 2; Seniors will attend during block 3.

January 5: *Junior College Kickoff!* This event will be held at 7pm and "kicks off" the college process for 11th grade students. All Junior families are encouraged to attend this program. The Counseling Department will discuss the process and procedure for applying to college, and will share important steps to be completed in the second semester of Junior year. A Zoom link will be shared shortly.

January 10: Counselors will begin holding *Junior College Planning Meetings* following our Junior Kickoff. You may begin scheduling these meetings on January 6, by emailing your School Counselor. As an additional resource, you can schedule an appointment with our College & Career Counselor, Mrs. Nicholson, after your initial college-planning meeting.

January 26: Instant Decision Day with County College of Morris. Students will meet with an Admissions Counselor to discuss the admissions process, your program of study, and placement testing. For instructions and registration, email Mrs.

Nicholson by January 14. This event will be hosted at MLHS; registered students will be excused from class during their time slot.



February 5: Practice ACT exam at 9am (VIRTUAL), hosted by the Princeton Review. Your results are available immediately upon completion of the exam. Learn more and register <u>HERE</u>.

February 12: Practice SAT exam at 9am (VIRTUAL), hosted by the Princeton Review. Your results are available immediately upon completion of the exam. Learn more and register <u>HERE</u>.

FINANCIAL AID:

- * Please be aware of your college's financial aid and scholarship deadlines. These deadlines are typically not flexible you may miss out on potential aid if you do not submit these documents in time.
- * The <u>Free Application for Federal Student Aid</u> (FAFSA) opened on October 1. This form must be completed if you are applying for need-based financial aid. Click <u>HERE</u> for resources on preparing for, completing, and submitting the FAFSA.
- * Check to see if your colleges also require the <u>CSS Profile</u> (review their financial aid website). Use this <u>guide</u> for help on completing the CSS Profile.
- * Quinnipiac University is hosting a Virtual Hands-on FAFSA Completion event on January 4! During this event, families can complete their FAFSA while receiving tips from our financial aid experts. Register here.



SCHOLARSHIPS & FEE WAIVERS:

200 Club of Morris County: Our scholarship program is limited to high school seniors who serve as Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) or Firefighters in Morris County, or whose parent/guardian is actively serving in or retired from the following agencies: Morris County police departments, Morris County fire departments, Morris County first aid squads, New Jersey State Police serving Morris County, Federal Law Enforcement serving Morris County. Scholarships will be awarded on a one-time basis for the 2022-2023 academic year. Award criteria includes academic performance, community service, extracurricular activities and financial need. Apply by February 15.



DAR National Scholarships: offers a wide array of scholarships for graduating high school students, college undergraduates, and graduate students. Awards are available for those planning to major in History, Nursing, English, Math, and more! Applications are due by January 31.

Diller Teen Tikkun Olam Awards: this scholarship is awarded to fifteen Jewish U.S. teens for exceptional leadership and engagement in initiatives making the world a better place. <u>Apply by</u> January 7.

Foundation 649 Scholarship: for graduating Asian American high schoolers (5 awards of \$4,000 spread over 4 years). The application consists of a questionnaire and a short essay. Creativity is welcome - alternate media will also be accepted in place of the essay if the applicant choose. Applicants should have a track record of involvement and interest in AAPI communities, issues, or causes and have demonstrated financial need for the scholarship. Apply by March 1.

Jacob Pierri Memorial Scholarship: The fund was established to honor the memory of our son, Jacob Pierri, and to commemorate and support the causes to which he was committed to and excelled at. Eligible students must plan to attend a four year college or university and ajor in Culinary Arts, Hospitality or Mathematics; additionally, you must have a GPA of 3.5+ and have worked and/or participated in community service. Apply by March 31.

MENSA Scholarship: Applicants have until Jan. 15 to write an essay of not more than 550 words explaining their career, academic and/or vocational goals and how they plan to achieve those goals. Learn more <u>here</u>.

P.L.A.Y. Scholars Helping Collars Scholarship: this \$1,500 scholarship rewards one student who can tell the best story, describing the impact he or she made in the life of a rescue animal or animal welfare cause in general. Apply by February 28.

Terry Crews Creative Courage Scholarship: One artist will receive \$20,000 to use toward their artistic development and education. To apply, submit a link to an original art piece you've created. Whether your passion is painting, photography, drawing, music, sculpture, or any other art form, share a piece that you are proud of and that demonstrates your artistic vision. Please also share a brief statement about your vision, the life experiences that have molded it, and your artistic dreams for the future. Apply by January 12.

Tzu Chi Scholars: selected on the basis of financial need, academic achievement, and community involvement. Each scholar will be awarded \$1,000. All graduating seniors are encouraged to apply. Apply by March 12.

Nomination Scholarships:

Norwich University High School Service Award: Strong candidates have conducted significant service to their school or their community. Interested students should email a brief statement about why they are interested in the nomination to Mrs. Nicholson. Please also include a resume or list of your service work.

SCAD Distinguished Scholars Award: Strong candidates have the following: GPA of 3.75; stellar visual arts, performing arts, writing, business or equestrian capabilities; honors and awards from competitions, or other recognitions; leadership skills demonstrated through co-curricular or extracurricular involvement. Interested students should email a brief statement about why they are interested in the nomination to Mrs. Nicholson.
