#### **SENIOR CLASS:**

\* Please let your counselor know when you hear back from colleges! We want to be there to support you and celebrate with you through this process. Students should also update their decisions in Naviance.



- \* If you are admitted Early Decision (binding), you must withdraw your applications from all other colleges. This can be done by emailing the Admission Office. Do not forget to complete this step!
- \* Check to make sure that your applications are complete. Most colleges will send you an email with instructions to set up an applicant portal, where you can see what documents they have received.
- \* Reminder: You must submit the <u>Transcript Request</u> <u>Form</u> to your counselor at least 3 weeks before your first college deadline.
- \* Reminder: You must submit the <u>FAFSA</u> if you are applying for need-based financial aid. Some colleges also require applicants to complete the <u>CSS Profile</u>. See the Financial Aid section on page 3 for more information.
- \* Seniors, here are some of the things that Mrs. Nicholson can assist you with:

# **SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES:**

College Board Opportunity Scholarships: Learn about their scholarship opportunities <a href="here">here</a>. Our College Board Ambassadors will share more details at the start of the Alumni Panel!

*C-SPAN StudentCam:* An annual national video documentary competition that encourages students to think critically about issues that affect our communities and our nation. Students in grades 6-12 are asked to create a short video documentary on a topic related to the competition theme, "Explore the issue you most

want the president and new Congress to address in 2021." C-SPAN awards prizes to the top 150 student documentaries. Apply by January 20.

Equitable Excellence Scholarship: For high school seniors who demonstrate courage, strength and wisdom as shown by community impact through volunteer service. Apply by December 15.

Foot Locker Scholar Athletes: Honors student-athletes who demonstrate exceptional academic ability and strong leadership skills in sports, in their schools, and within their communities. Twenty students will be selected to receive \$20,000 in scholarship. Applicants must be seniors (enrolling in college in Fall 2021), have a 3.0 GPA, and currently participate in sports. Apply by January 8.

Hispanic Heritage Youth Awards: Honors Latino high school seniors who excel in the classroom and community and for their excellence in various categories including: Business & Finance, Engineering, Entrepreneurship, Education, Healthcare & Science, Media & Entertainment, Social Justice and Technology. Apply by December 6.

Morris Arts: Apply for the Elaine Ehlers Arts Scholarship (\$5,000) or Eugenie Coladarci Arts Scholarship (\$1,500). These awards recognize a graduating high school senior who has exhibited artistic excellence in dance, drama, visual arts, or music. Applicants must be Morris County residents who plan to pursue post-secondary studies at an accredited institution or acknowledged arts school or fine arts program. Applications (due January 22) are available <a href="here">here</a>.

Profile in Courage Essay Contest: Challenges students to write an original and creative essay that demonstrates an understanding of political courage as described by John F. Kennedy in *Profiles in Courage*. Multiple awards are offered; the first-place winner will receive a \$10,000 award. Apply by January 15.

Science Ambassador Scholarship: A full—tuition scholarship for a woman in science, technology, engineering, or math. You must be a high school senior or an undergraduate college student to apply. Film a 3 minute educational video of yourself explaining a STEM topic you're passionate about. Apply by December 14<sup>th</sup>.

Washington Crossing Foundation Scholarship: Competition open to all high school seniors who are planning careers of service to the United States in local, state, or federal government. Scholarships range from \$500 to \$5,000. Apply by January 15.

#### WINTER/SPRING PRE-COLLEGE PROGRAMS:

Cornell University: As a high school student, you may request approval to take online Cornell courses during their Winter Session. Current high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors are eligible. MIT THINK Scholars: A science, research, and innovation program for high school students. Students apply by submitting a research proposal for any novel science, technology, or engineering idea. # **SUMMER PROGRAMS:**

It is not too early to be thinking about summer! Many programs have January or February deadlines. More opportunities will be shared in each Bulletin.

Bank of America Student Leaders: As a Student Leader, you will participate in an 8 week paid internship at a local nonprofit organization. You will also attend the Student Leaders Summit held in Washington, D.C. where you will learn how government, business and the nonprofit sector work together to address critical community needs. Applicants must be a current junior or senior. Apply by January 29. Learn more here.

Columbia University offers a variety of summer programs for high school students. Options are available for students of all HS grade levels. Learn about their programs here.

Iacocca Global Entrepreneurship Intensive at Lehigh University: Brings high school sophomores and juniors together from all regions of the world for 4 weeks to live and learn together at Lehigh. Students learn about entrepreneurship, design thinking, project collaboration and teamwork, global leadership and working within a culturally diverse environment. Notre Dame Summer Scholars: Summer Scholars participants spend two intensive weeks in one of 25 exciting programs of study. The coursework is a true preview of college academics—it is both rigorous and rewarding, and students earn one college credit upon the completion of a program track.
