#### Acknowledge your feelings, and let yourself grieve (just a bit).

- Maybe you had gotten really excited (or even confident) about the school, and now it won't
  happen. That feels awful and sometimes hurtful. So allow yourself a couple days to grieve
  the loss—cry, wallow, and even shred/burn your rejection letter.
- Just try not get stuck in "What ifs" These can drive you crazy! And make sure you don't let
  yourself get wrapped up in feeling bad for too long. Grieve, but then move forward.



#### Try to remember: It's not personal.

- Almost every senior receives at least one college rejection letter, so you're not alone. For many, it's just one (unfortunate) part of the college process.
- It doesn't mean you didn't deserve it. At many colleges, there are more deserving applicants than there are available spots.
- A college rejection is not a rejection of who you are. Your college app didn't 100% represent all the facets of who you are and what makes you great.

# **FINANCIAL AID:**

# **SCHOLARSHIPS:**

**ACS Scholars Program:** is open to graduating seniors who identify as African-American/Black, Hispanic/Latino, or American Indian. Applicants must be intending to major in chemistry, biochemistry, chemical engineering, chemical technology, or another chemistry-related science AND planning to pursue a career in a chemistry-related science as well. **Apply by March 1.** 

Connections for the Future Scholarship: Up to \$1,000 for a graduating public school senior with disabilities from Bergen, Passaic, Hudson, Essex, Morris, Somerset, Union, Warren or Sussex County. The scholarship provides financial support to public school graduates with disabilities (IEP or 504) so that they may pursue post-secondary education, training, and other life-enhancing opportunities. Apply by April 1.

MLHS Friends of the Arts: awards \$1,000 scholarships to selected applicants from the MLHS Class of 2022. The Friends of the Arts Scholarship acknowledges graduating seniors who have actively participated in the visual and/or performing arts both in and out of the school setting, and who plan to continue participating in the arts in the future. Primary consideration will be given to the student's active participation in any area of the visual or performing arts while in high school. Applications Due: May 6.

**Lessons In Your Home Scholarship** (\$500): is open to seniors (ages 18+) who plan to study aspects of music, music business, performance, or production (major or minor in any music school program. Applicants must submit a 600-word essay on why the world needs music, along with a summary of your journey in music. Apply by March 25.

Montville UNICO Service Above Self Scholarship: will be offered to a qualified Montville resident of Italian descent who is graduating in 2022. Applicants must have demonstrated extraordinary efforts to give back to the community as exemplified by UNICO's mission of "Service Above Self." Contact Mrs. Nicholson for a copy of the application or visit http://www.montvilleunicofoundation.org. Nomination must be received in the Montville UNICO post office box no later than April 1.



Morris County Association of School Business Officials is sponsoring the Jerome F. Sullivan and MCASBO Memorial Scholarship: Applicants are eligible for a \$1,000-\$2,000 scholarship. Mountain Lakes High School can nominate one applicant (a graduating senior). Please include your extracurricular activities, any positions of leadership/awards, and your planned college major (must be business related).

**ScholarSHPE:** The Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers provides scholarships for graduating high school seniors beginning a STEM undergraduate career at a community college or 4-year university. Apply by April 30.

**TheDream.US National Scholarship:** Applications are open to immigrant students with or without DACA or TPS who came to the U.S. before the age of 16 and before Nov. 1, 2016. Apply before the February 28 application deadline. The

National Scholarship provides up to \$37,000 to cover tuition, fees, books and supplies for students to earn a bachelor's degree at a Partner College.

# **SUMMER PROGRAMS & OTHER OPPORTUNITIES:**

**Bentley Wall Street 101**: is a competitive experiential learning program for rising high school juniors and seniors interested in global finance and investing, including stocks, bonds, currencies and commodities. The sessions introduce students to the art and science of trading, investing, and managing a portfolio. In small classes led by Bentley-trained faculty with industry experience, students participate in lectures, case analyses, interactive trading simulations and presentations by Wall Street professionals. Learn more here.

**Bossgirls:** You'll join a community of other bossgirls like yourself to discover entrepreneurship. You and a team of other bossgirls will focus on a problem, come up with an innovative solution for it, research the market, compare competitors, learn how to price your product & prototype it, and create a brand around your idea. At the end of the program, you'll pitch your idea to a virtual audience--think Shark Tank without the sharks. Bossgirls Summer 2022 is expected to be a hybrid program, taking place both virtually and in-person. We plan to hold most workshops and lectures online, but have some activities take place in person at The City College of New York. We take applications from female and non-binary high school students in grades 9-12. This is a no-cost program thanks to our sponsors, Standard Chartered. **Boston University Summer Journalism Academy:** teaches high school students core skills in news reporting, interviewing, and writing, while focusing on hands-on experience in and around Boston and their home communities. Taught by award-winning working journalists such as Pulitzer Prize winner Lara Salahi, students learn how to follow facts and get to the heart of stories affecting communities. In the past, our students spoke with policymakers, reported from a massive immigration march, and highlighted issues affecting teens during the pandemic. They learned how to interview strangers, ask probing questions, and assemble information in a concise story with a deadline. For students living on-campus,



they have the opportunity to meet with Boston University's representative to discuss the college admissions process and explore what it's like living in a residence hall and studying in a university environment. If you are accepted into program and pay the registration fee by March 31, you will receive a special discount of \$400 off the in-person tuition (EARLYCAMPUS22) and \$200 off tuition for the virtual program (EARLYRLFH22). **Bucknell Academy Summer Experience (BASE):** Rising high school juniors and seniors spend a week living like a college student. BASE participants join Bucknell faculty and students to find innovative solutions to pressing issues. Perhaps you'll team up with environmental engineers and global managers to create better technology for clean water. Or maybe you'll collaborate with performing artists and biomedical engineers to reimagine prosthetics used by actors or musicians.
